Government of Canada Procurement Transformation: Savings are a given, what other impact do we expect?

David Rotor, Special Advisor, Acquisitions Business Transformation, Public Works and Government Services Canada

In this presentation David Rotor will address the status of procurement transformation in the Government Canada, with a focus on two areas:

Technology

- The way in which technology will be used to drive the expected benefits such as reducing costs and improving efficiencies
- The less obvious benefits of technology such as improving access for suppliers from the aboriginal, "green", and small business communities
- The ability of technology to assist in changing the concept of accountability from a post transaction audit and reporting bias to one that allows compliance and accountability to be integrated into the workflow of a transaction

The impact of reducing the costs of goods and services for the Government of Canada

- Savings are coming from several areas including simple negotiations to reduce prices to complex programs to improve supplier productivity; what is our experience to date and where are we focusing on in the future
- Intuitively buyers drive to aggregate demand in order to achieve volume savings. How successful is this and what other approaches does the Government of Canada use?
- Small enterprises, aboriginal businesses, and "green" procurement are
 important to us from a social and economic development perspective, they
 are also highly competitive sources of supply for certain goods and services
 what have we learned about using these suppliers to help drive lower costs
 and greater productivity?

Andrée Jetté, Director, Vision 360



Participants will have to identify concrete means of adapting themselves to stressful situations in their environment.

We suggest the following approach:

- **To inform:** a light presentation on the basic theory concerning body language and the stress mechanism.
- **Sensitize**: to make each participant aware of different stressing situations in their daily life.
- To Enable: through laughing, movement and pleasure, each participant
 acquires four tools in burn out prevention enabling them to face different
 stressful situations. (Emotional, physical, mental and environmental.)
- *Motivate:* through discussions and games, create in each participant a desire to apply the tools acquired during the session.



1 - CITT: The Good, The Bad and the Ugly (Update on CITT Decisions 2005-2006)

This round-table discussion will focus on the decisions of the CITT during the past two years. The effect of these decisions upon Federal Government procurement will be discussed followed by a debate on the need for reform of the CITT's role in light of its decisions.

2 - CASS (Corporate Administrative Shared Services)

Presenter(s) to be announced

Come hear from the stakeholders in the Corporate Administrative Shared Services (CASS) initiative, including the Shared Services Office (SSO), Wave 1 departments and TBS.

The objective of the CASS project is to improve the delivery of corporate and administrative services through the establishment of a SSO, created to realize the benefits of shared investment and allow departmental retention of savings. Improved management, program delivery and efficiency of these services are the expected results.

Work is currently underway to establish baseline data of the current processes, including costs, IM/IT/IS, and performance and volume metrics. This work will then identify the transformation opportunities with the greatest potential for improvement.

3 - Business Transformation: Successes and Challenges

Paul Hession, Director General, Service Qualification and Transfer, Information Communication Technologies, Information Technology Services Branch, Public Works and Government Services Canada

Deirdre Kerr-Perrott, Director General, Administration Directorate, Finance and Administration Branch, Canada Revenue Agency

Around the world, public and private sector organizations are increasingly adopting shared services as a strategy to reduce costs, simplify business processes, and to enhance service quality and responsiveness. In Budget 2005, the Government of Canada (GC) outlined its commitment to the IT Shared Services initiative – as an element of an overall Shared Services Agenda – to improve the management of IT services across departments, boards and agencies. The initiative rests on the premise that a government-wide coordinated approach to managing IT services can yield better, faster, more cost effective results for clients and taxpayers. Paul Hession will summarize this initiative in terms of business drivers, financial savings and cost reduction opportunities, leadership, vision, change management, development methodology, and adopted implementation as well as deployment strategies.

The pressures of expenditure reviews, the need to enhance client service and the increasing need to ensure compliance to policies and guidelines are factors all government-contracting organizations are dealing with today. In the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA), these issues were addressed through the change from a transaction-based environment to a strategic-driven procurement function. Through Dierdre Kerr-Perrott you will find out the challenges and successes of CRA's Business Transformation initiative and how it revolutionized the Agency's ability to meet its contracting needs.

4 - Maritime Helicopter Procurement - A New Way of Doing Business

Bill Miller, Procurement Manager, Maritime Helicopter Project, Public Works and Government Services Canada

The procurement strategy for the acquisition and support of the new Maritime Helicopters being procured by PWGSC for the Department of National Defence fits very nicely into the theme of this year's Materiel Management National Workshop. This presentation will detail the traditional process of procuring a major system such as a helicopter and then will address how that process was modified to enable the establishment of performance based acquisition and long term support contracts.

Bill Miller will address the procurement strategy and the provisions of the Maritime Helicopter Contracts as they apply to the changes in the way normal Government procurement is addressed. This will include discussion of the procurement goals, how the achievability of these goals was determined, the extent to which they were achieved, and how Contractor performance is being monitored and incentivized both during the initial development period and over the service life of the Maritime Helicopter. As this presentation is related only to the procurement process, it will not discuss the bids, the bidders, or the results of the evaluations.

This presentation will begin with a general overview of Strategic Sourcing, followed by the Canada Revenue Agency's approach to each step of the process:

- · Assess the Opportunities

- RFP Process
- Implementation

An up-to-date snapshot of the savings achieved on these commodities will be provided, as well as the changes required to internal business processes and the challenges faced in implementation.

7 - The Federal Vehicles Initiative: Sharing the Cost of Leadership

Anthony C. Taylor, Director, Transportation Energy Use, Office of Energy Efficiency, Natural Resources Canada

This presentation will focus on the Federal Fleet Initiative (FFI), which is managed by Natural Resources Canada and is steered by an interdepartmental committee that includes NRCan, TBS, EC, and PWGSC. An overview of some of the project initiatives, including the Leadership Vehicle Project and Idling Reduction Campaigns, will provide concrete examples of good fleet management practices and environmental stewardship.

8 - A New Paradigm for Managing Transactions

John Lee, General Manager, Enterprise Solutions, Canada Post Corporation

Many SME and even large enterprises have experienced great, and expensive, difficulties in automating all of the paper transactions in their supply chains, customer communications and order processing environments. EDI, a critically important business tool, has remained out of reach for many businesses and business applications. Another approach is possible. A multi-client imaging/digitization service provider can turn your major transactional paperflows into data, delivered into your workflow application systems.

9 - Canada School of Public Service: Your Partner in Learning

You will also see a demonstration of the Government of Canada Marketplace (GoCM) Prototype, which is fully functional, integrated with the PWGSC financial system, and includes the use of electronic catalogues for copy paper, office supplies, information technology professional services, and vehicles. The demonstration will provide an overview of the purchasing business processes within the GoCM. The demonstration includes the search and order of goods, receipt of goods, invoice, approvals, and supplier processes. The reporting and analysis capabilities of the GoCM will also be featured. The Government of Canada is undergoing an unprecedented transformation of its approach to procurement targeted at saving the government in excess of \$2.5B over five years by reducing costs, increasing internal efficiencies and shortening time to complete transactions. Come hear about the move to a whole-of-government commodity management approach and how engaging our employees and our clients as partners will lead to success.

Together, these initiatives are helping our government work better and cost less. Now with the first year nearing completion, this presentation will identify the progress to date, some of the challenges ahead and our next steps to achieve success in this endeavor.

15 - Quality Improvement Starts with Process Mapping

Ken Cierpicki, Director, Corporate Services Division, Canada Revenue Agency

Ken Cierpicki will share the Agency's experiences with Process Management as a basis for major change.

Over the last year the CRA has utilized a process management approach to develop process maps for current activities and their related costs. This, combined with making process improvements, resulted in number of measurable and positive changes including the implementation of standard, national processes in the Agency's administration activities.

16 - Promoting Diversity in Procurement

Allen Frost, Director, Economic Development Programs Directorate, Indian and Northern Affairs Canada

This presentation will focus on the Procurement Strategy for Aboriginal Business (PSAB). This year marks the tenth year celebration of the implementation of the PSAB. 17 - Sustainable Development Strategies and Green Procurement

Elizabeth Hopkins, Director, Policy Development, Public Works and Government Services

The scope of spending on goods and services provides a real opportunity for the federal government to use its purchasing power to support environmental sustainability and help drive Canadian competitiveness. The Commissioner of the Environment and Sustainable Development made federal green procurement the focus of one its 2005 reports. This panel presentation will provide an overview of the Commissioner's findings and recommendations, and what the government has been doing to respond to these recommendations. The presentation will highlight the main features of the new federal green procurement policy, implementation progress to date, and what this could mean for you.




