Michael Orchard, Senior Analyst, Materiel Management Policy, Fisheries and Oceans Canada

Michael Orchard is a Senior Analyst, Materiel Management Policy for the Fisheries and Oceans Canada. Over the course of his 30 + year career he held several management positions in the public and private sectors focused on procurement, materiel management and supply chain management. Most recently, he spent 15 years as Manager, Supply Chain Management for the Canadian Coast Guard (CCG).

During his time with the Coast Guard he led the development of supply chain guidance and procedures supporting the CCG's Asset Management System including the establishment of a materiel identification group responsible for cataloguing parts, equipment and raw material in accordance with the NATO cataloguing system. He also developed a national spares management strategy and guideline that identifies key considerations for the optimum management of nationally managed spares and materiel across the organization including the assessment and optimization of warehouse / storage space.

When he has free time Michael is an avid golfer during the summer and enjoys curling during the winter.

Stephen March, Director, Digital Platforms, Shared Services Canada

Stephen March is the principal digital lazer ninja (aka: Director) of the Digital Platform and Interoperability team within SSC. In this role, he is a hands on technical director leading an application innovation agenda where resources specialize in cloud application platforms, modern interoperability platforms, Internet of Things and Edge Compute applications, and the Digital Enablement Makerspace for STEM research. Over the past 25 years, Stephen has primarily focused on application development, architecture, database administration and geographic information systems development. In his spare time, he is an avid gardener and has a fully automated hydroponic setup where he is trying to get better at combining IoT platforms and agriculture to enable greater food security.

Currently William is exploring the world of Internet of Things and helping SSC find ways to help other government departments take advantage of the possibilities the use of smart devices and sensors provides.

INFLUENCE OF 3D PRINTING ON MATERIEL MANAGEMENT

3D printing is becoming more and more accessible, it is now being used to build assets, supplies or spare parts to repair equipment. Learn what 3D printing can do, the cost, environmental footprint, other considerations, and real-life applications in the federal government.

Douglas Schillinger, Section Head, Ocean Engineering and Technology Section, Fisheries and Oceans Canada

Doug Schillinger received a BSc in Physics from the University of Guelph, and MSc in Physics and Physical Oceanography from Memorial University. Following a decade at Dalhousie university working as a research assistant and research associate in the Ocean Acoustics Lab, he changed pace and moved into sales, selling equipment for the ocean tech company RBR Ltd. In 2018 he moved back to research and was employed by Fisheries and Oceans doing field work to validate real-time port-scale coastal ocean models, and to conduct process driven studies to quantify model accuracy. Currently he manages the Ocean Engineering and Technology Section in the Maritimes region of DFO, overseeing a high skilled staff comprised of mechanical and electrical engineers, electrical technicians, field technicians, welders, and machine shop specialists. The design and fabrication contingent of this section works to produce both large and small scale components for use in ocean research. The addition of three 3D printers has complemented the traditional welding and machine shops onsite at BIO.
